Course Overview

This course is a basic introduction to major religions of the world. We will explore beliefs and practices of religions native to each continent. As a group we will discuss specific themes that are common to most religions, and consider differences and similarities in the cultural practices of specific groups.

Aim and Objective

Our goal will be to acquire a deeper understanding of diverse cultures, and foster respect for the beliefs of others. Students will gain:

- Knowledge of major religions and religious practice in today's world.
- Familiarity with the features that are common in many world religions.
- Acquaintance with religious terminology.
- A better understanding of their own beliefs.
- Empathy for people of different religious beliefs.
- Experience in using critical thinking skills.
- The ability to write intelligently about various aspects of religions.

Course Hours

The course has 25 sessions in total. Each class session is 120 minutes in length. The course meets from Monday to Friday.

1. Hopfe, L. M. & Woodward, M. R. (2009). *Religions of the World* (11th ed.). Upper Saddle, NJ: Prentice Hall.
2. Folder. This should be used to save additional readings handed out in class, as well as your completed and graded assignments.

Assessment

Attendance and promptness

Academic Honesty
