Course Description

In this course, you will study major movements and influential artists in Western art history from the fifteenth century to the twentieth century. We will look at major developments in painting, sculpture and architecture from a historical and cultural perspective, asking questions about the viewpoints of artists and patrons in various regions and time periods. Why were various works created at a particular time and in a particular place?

We will also study tools to analyze and understand iconography, color, perspective, texture, and forms. These tools will help you discover how artists used materials to create specific effects. The skills learned in class will facilitate discussions of Renaissance to Modern works of art, but they can also be used beyond the classroom to explore all aspects of the visual world around you.

Course Goals

At the end of the course the student will be able to:

- Understand terms and components of western art.
- Explain major trends in western art.
- Identify and understand the works of select artists and architects.
- Give a general overview of the historical context of specific works.
- Write intelligently about art.
- Use critical thinking skills to discuss the contemporary visual culture that surrounds them.

Course Hours

Academic Honesty
