Course Description

This course is an introduction to digital photography. The students will learn basic camera operations and use of color correction and photo manipulation with Adobe PhotoShop Elements. Issues of color, compression, resolution, and image quality are covered. Students will be challenged to understand digital photography within the larger context of photography as vernacular, visual culture and art.

Required Material

- Digital Camera (DSLR is preferred, but any camera with multiple scene settings will work)
- Card-reader or usb cord to import images to your computer from your camera
- Laptop with PhotoShop Elements. A trial version of PhotoShop Elements is available at adobe.com or you can purchase it for \$69.99)
- Thumb drive with at least 40 gigs of space. You will turn in this thumb drive. So, do not use it for other classes.
- Printing of images for final critique.
